Vision of the Institution is to Include, Ignite and Innovate. The institution has an aim to inculcate love for knowledge and provide quality education to all the students coming from every stratum of the society, so that all of them develop into complete individuals in future who will be equipped and empowered with relevant knowledge, competence to face challenges. There are section supervisors to look after the administration of the morning and the evening sections, which involve assisting the Principal for the Bio-science and the Commerce sections respectively. There are different sub-committees comprising representatives from the different sections of the college, teaching and nonteaching staff and students, to look after and manage important administrative activities of the college. 42. Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability/Alternate Energy initiatives taken by the institution

:

1. Sustainable landscaping was done by introducing vertical gardening in 2019-20 by which the college utilises its premises at its maximum capacity with aesthetic valences.

2. College authority has introduced eco-accommodating 10KW inverters as elective force backup instead of fuel-based generators utilized prior. Energy-saving LED and CFL lights have been introduced in each spot of the college premises in substitution of tube lights utilized before.
3. Solar panels of 50KW were installed and the power produced is communicated to the public lattice. This has cut down the power bill of the college generously.
4. Proper segregation of chemical and biological waste from different practical based departments was done in specific isolated bins. Prompt disposal of biological waste in areas specified by corporations are made.
5. Waste containers were set at strategic points in the college sites to check littering. Furthermore, separate waste canisters were reserved for biodegradable and non - biodegradable waste materials.
6. To oversee garbage removal, college set up a vermicompost unit containing suitable species of earthworms to enhance the process of organic waste conversion.

3. Our Teacher's Council and one of our colleague took the total educational responsibility of a child from Antodaya Ashram-Purba medinipur.
4. Online Facilities for Students During Pandemic: With the onset of the Covid-19 Pandemic, the college took prompt measures to provide students with facilities to continue learning from their home.
 - (i) A Learning Management System portal was introduced where all the study materials and resources were regularly uploaded for students.
 - (ii) Full-fledged virtual classes were conducted through platforms like Google Meet and Zoom.
5. Providing a Rounded Learning Environment: Students are nurtured to have a balanced education through various extracurricular activities like NCC Camps. The college organises training camps for students with NCC where they take part in arms firing, navigation, map reading, emergency medical assistance and other disaster management related activities. Cdt. Neha Firdosh of New Alipore College received appreciation from the NCC Group HQ Kolkata for her exceptional performance in shooting competition.
6. Social Service: To inculcate a sense of social responsibility and sensitivity amongst the students and to promote value-based education, the college conducted social work by distributing food and essential items to the old and needy throughout the lockdown period.
7. Maintaining Global Environment Standards: The college stood by its promise of maintaining the global environment standards with an ISO 14001:2015 certification by keeping a clean environment and a plastic free campus. With a sophisticated vermicompostsystem, the college has ensured zero waste. The campus also has an assorted waste management system, vertical gardening, solar powered electrical units and a range of medicinal plants like Tulsi, Neem and Ashwagandha.







